Furthermore, if you want a true matte black for a "murdered out" look, powder coating is the only way to get a consistent, durable flat finish that won't chip the first time you hit a rimshot.

Durability on the Road

Touring is brutal on gear. Hardware gets thrown into road cases, rattled around in trailers, and set up and torn down nightly. Standard paint or cheap plating will flake off, exposing the steel to rust. Powder coating is an industrial finish. It is flexible enough to handle the vibration of the drums and hard enough to resist the scratches from road cases. Coating your microphone stands and cymbal booms also prevents the glare that often annoys lighting directors and camera operators during filmed performances.

Color Coordination

Imagine a white drum kit with blood-red hardware for a rock band, or a vintage cream kit with copper-vein hoops for a steampunk vibe. The creative possibilities are endless. We have seen drummers color-code their memory locks and wing nuts to make setup faster for their techs. By making specific parts distinct colors, you can ensure that the right stand goes to the right spot on the riser every time, streamlining the pre-show chaos.

Resurfacing Vintage Parts

For those restoring vintage drums, finding replacement lugs for a 1960s kit is difficult and expensive. Often, the original chrome is pitted and peeling. Powder coating provides a way to save these original parts. Sandblasting removes the old, damaged plating, and a fresh coat of powder seals the metal. You preserve the original sound and structure of the drum while giving it a fresh, custom look that purists and modern players alike can appreciate.
